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Lyme Regis Wednesday 15 April

Getting the trailer back out of the water proved a little too hard for Sally and I as it had got stuck in a couple of holes, er... lads what were you all doing on the boat already? It was not long before we were underway, and a short while later, Jay was busy locating the Baygittano. After managing to get a direct hit with the shot, the first pair of divers were on their way. The first challenge was to get to the shot line, which meant no messing, get swimming, and after a brief recovery time, down we went. There was quite a current. From around 10m we could see the bottom, and my first view of the 'Baggy'. Wow she did look pretty impressive, and it was not long after that Sally and I were having a good look around and becoming good at spotting conger eels hiding in the boilers and various floor spaces, and a variety of crustaceans! There were shoals of fish swimming around too! It did not seem very long before we were ascending, and whilst carrying out our safety stop, we were graced by the presence of a large jellyfish, which kept us mesmerised for a bit. There were lots of these around. Peter N and Jay were busy keeping an eye out for us all returning. Richard W and Peter T was the other buddy pair, and once they were safely back on board it was time for lunch! Well done to Peter T for managing to remain with his buddy. Richard – what happened to your weight belt??!! For those who do not know, please ask him!



We sat outside and enjoyed the sunshine and lunch, and then it was time to go for our second dive. Peter T being his usual humorous self, decided that Sally and I were taking too long to get our kit sorted...only to be reminded later that he needed to get into his drysuit properly! On our second visit to the 'Baggy', Sally and I became acquainted with some nice large lobsters that had got caught up in fishing line, and had to be cut free, and we had a close look at other crustaceans. Other divers found some flat fish, and a couple of old spent ammunition shells.

After we had got the boat out, cleaned and sorted and everyone was reunited with their kit we stopped off at the Olde Pop Inn for well-earned refreshments. We arrived back in the area about 2200, feeling rather tired!!

A huge thanks to Richard and Sally for arranging this, and thanks to Sally for being so supportive and sharing her extensive knowledge. I had a fabulous day, as I am sure everyone else did too. I could not have asked for anything better for a first British Sea Dive.

INFORMATION REGARDING TOWING THE BOATS

After our committee meeting, I now have a further update on the information with regard to the law and towing the club boats.

There are 2 issues which need addressing. The first one is the law, brought in on 1st January 1997, which restricts the weight of vehicle that a driver can tow.

On the D V L A website, anyone who has passed their test after 1st Jan, 1997 can only tow a trailer which weighs over 750kg as long as the combined weight of the vehicle and the trailer is less than 3500 Kg. Above that weight the driver needs to take an extra test.

Both Hornet and Portia have been weighed in their travelling state, without personal kit but with anchors and possibly some fuel in the tanks.

HORNET WEIGHED 1650KG.

PORTIA WEIGHED 1600 KG.

The D V L A rules on the website at the moment state that the laden weight of the trailer MUST NOT exceed the un-laden weight of the towing vehicle. This means that Hornet @ 1650 Kg plus a towing vehicle @ 1650 Kg have a combined weight of 3300 Kg. If Hornet then has the fuel tank filled this can add another 50 – 100 Kg to the weight, making Hornet weigh 1700 – 1750 Kg. and then the towing vehicle must be the equivalent weight. Therefore the combined weight now becomes 3400Kg to 3500Kg. As soon as a passenger and any kit is put in the car, the combined weight will exceed the 3500Kg limit and the driver is then towing without a licence and without insurance.

On the chassis of the trailer is a plate which specifies the highest weight that the trailer can legally carry. This is called the Gross Vehicle Weight (GVW). Our trailers both have their appropriate GVW set at 2200 Kg. Although Hornet weighs 1650 Kg and Portia weighs 1600Kg, we need to be able to put extra weight in them, for instance divers kit, fuel and, when towed out of the sea, gallons of water. Because of these extras, both trailers have been plated at 2200 Kg. giving us a leeway of 550 – 600 Kg of equipment.

If we look at BSAC recommendations with regard to this law, they state that for anyone who passed their test after 1st Jan 1997, the combined Gross Vehicle Weight (GVW) of the car plus the GVW of the trailer must not exceed 3500 Kg. The plated weight of both trailers is 2200Kg and, going by this rule, there is obviously only 1300Kg left for a vehicle.

Whichever way we look at this law, anyone who took their test after 1st Jan 1997 will need to take a further test.

Your B licence has a provisional entitlement to tow trailers over this weight limit as long as the driver displays L plates and is accompanied by a qualified driver who has held the equivalent licence for at least 3 years. I have checked this with the D V L A and also Hughes Driver Training who specialise in all trailer and lorry training. The advice from the D V L A was very unclear but the advice from Hughes Driver Training was very specific. They say that the qualified driver must have actually PASSED the appropriate test so, although most of us in the club are entitled to tow the trailer, we are not qualified to be the accompanying driver. We are trying to get written confirmation as to the

rule but, in the meantime, to ensure we comply with the law, we are going with the advice that you must have passed the test to be the accompanying driver.

The test isn't very expensive and most drivers probably wouldn't need many lessons so the qualification should be quite easy to get.

The second issue is the size of car that can tow the trailers.

On the chassis of the trailer is a plate which specifies the highest weight that the trailer can legally carry. This is called the Gross Vehicle Weight (GVW). Our trailers both have their appropriate GVW set at 2200 Kg. This is the total weight that the trailer can carry and must not be exceeded. Although Hornet weighs 1650 Kg and Portia weighs 1600Kg, we need to be able to put extra weight in them, for instance divers kit, fuel and, when towed out of the sea, gallons of water. Because of these extras, both trailers have been plated at 2200 Kg. giving us a leeway of 550 – 600 Kg of equipment.

At the moment the D V L A has a rule that the GVW of the trailer must not exceed the un-laden weight of the towing vehicle. Therefore all towing vehicles MUST be a minimum of 2200 Kg un-laden weight.

However, the guidance from BSAC is that the D V L A have changed the rule but not yet updated it on the website. They now say that we all have to check with our vehicle handbook to see what our own car can tow. This has actually made it more confusing because every handbook I have looked at gives a maximum towing weight but doesn't specify if that is actual weight or GVW. The problem here is that when the boat is laden, we have absolutely no idea what the actual weight is and need to make an allowance for the equipment

If we look at the kit likely to be carried in the boat, our 12 litre cylinders weigh 15 Kg each and stab jackets normally weigh around 5 – 6 Kg each. If we look at the likely weight in the boat of the kit for 6 divers, 3 twinsets and 3 single cylinders the dry weight would be 135 Kg of cylinders, 35 Kg of stab jackets, 6 weight belts around 60 Kg, demand valves, fins, reels, torches all add up. There is also the weight of water held in the fabric of the kit but I have no idea how much that would weigh. From this, we can assume that towing the boat out of the water after a dive with the kit still on board would add at least 250 Kg plus water.

The conclusion we have come to is that while the D V L A still has the rule on the website, we need to take that into account as well as the information in our car handbooks.

For example although Jay has the correct licence to tow, his car has an un-laden weight of 2100 Kg and is therefore not able to tow either trailer.

Emma, who passed her test after Jan 1997, must take the trailer test and have a vehicle weighing over 2200 Kg un-laden and comply with the recommendations in her handbook before she can tow.

Geoff's car has an un-laden weight of 2200 Kg, a towing capacity of 1800 Kg and a combined allowable weight of 4500Kg. He can tow the boat as long as there is only 150 Kg of extra kit in the boat.

Richard's car with an un-laden weight of 3010Kg and a towing capacity of 2800Kg is well within limits.

When the D V L A update their website, we will have a better idea of the rules but, until then, these are the protocols we must adhere to.

All drivers have an obligation to ensure that they are legal to tow the boats. The police are tightening up on the rules and checking more trailers. I spoke to Rupert Perry who has recently used a works van to collect a trailer from Indespension. Although the trailer was empty and probably weighed around 400 – 500 Kg, he was pulled in by the police because the plated weight of the trailer was higher than the un-laden weight of the van and meant that it was illegal to tow behind the van he was using. He received a severe reprimand and was lucky to get away without prosecution.

Our company lorries are being weight checked more often than they used to be, the police have the right to pull you over, and if that happens to our boats and you are found to be overweight, you would be stopped from travelling and we would have to arrange collection, plus there would be fines and penalty points for the driver.

Can you please check your handbooks and make sure you are able to tow, if you have any doubts, please talk to us to try to resolve any problems. Unfortunately the onus is on each member to do this, if you tow and the law is broken you are at fault and risk both your licence and invalidating your insurance and that of the club boat and trailer, and you may also be held responsible for any loss the club suffers.

I ask you, what is a girl to do? This turn of events required a pretty clever solution. I had to change to be a master of disguise.

MEMBERSHIP FEES 2013

To the Stratford Branch, all

Members pay an annual subscription of £118 towards costs of the Branch.

To BSAC, Members pay an annual subscription of £56.50 that covers BSAC costs, their monthly 'Scuba' magazine and their third party insurance. Both of the above are due on the 1st April each year.

New members are required to pay a full annual subscription for both of the above when they join. In their second year they pay pro-rata to bring them to the next 1st April.

Hire of kit for a new trainee is £60 for a period of for four months. Thereafter it is £30 per month.

Pool Sessions - £3 for all Members

Try a Dive £15 a session. £10 of this is refundable when you join the club.

Training Books vary but typically the cost for an Ocean Diver is £45.

The Club has 2 boats (RIB's) and the Committee believes that Members should contribute towards the cost of running these boats in proportion to how often they dive from them. This is paid for by a compulsory Annual Boat Levy of £30 payable along with your Annual Subscription by all Members in their second year onwards If you do minimal diving from the Club boats during the year you will receive a full or part refund of your Boat Levy. Non members diving from Club RIBs will pay £10 per dive.

Members towing RIB's get a minimum of 56 pence per mile

CLUB DIVING STANDARDS

All Members are expected to dive in accordance with the guidelines of the BSAC as published from time to time.

No dives should be organised without the prior approval of the Diving Officer who will provide you with a Diving Log which is to be completed with details of the dive and returned to him.

On the reverse side of the Diving Log is a list of the main BSAC guidelines that the Committee wishes to emphasise at this time.

You are reminded that the depth limits for qualified divers is as follows:

Ocean Divers – 20 metres

Sports Divers – 35 metres

All other qualified divers – 50 metres

Members who ignore any of these guidelines do so entirely at their own risk.

You are also reminded of the following:

- Members are strongly recommended to use Delayed Surface Marker Buoys which can be filled by means other than purged air from a mouthpiece.
- Sports Divers and above are recommended to carry their own independent source of back-up air in a second cylinder (twin or pony)

These extracts are not exhaustive and so if you have any queries you should clear these with the Diving Officer before diving.
